



## **2014 LBA LEGISLATIVE DAY in Sacramento**

**May 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup> & 6<sup>th</sup>**

### **AB 690 (Campos) SUPPORT**

Repeals and recasts statutory provisions within the Government Code relating to California and Mexico relations including adding the Director of the Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development (GO-Biz) to the membership of the California-Mexico Border Relations Council (Border Relations Council) and designating him or her as Chair. This bill, expands the membership of the Border Relations Council to include the Director of GO-Biz, transfers the responsibility to chair the Border Relations Council from the Secretary of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to the Director of GO-Biz and reorganizes the statutory placement of the Office of California-Mexico Affairs (Mexico Affairs Office) and the Border Relations Council from a general title within state government to a more specific title on foreign relations within the Government Code.

### **SB 935 (Leno) Minimum Wage – OPPOSE**

Unfairly increases employer costs by increasing the minimum wage to \$13 by 2017 and then increased thereafter according to the Consumer Price Index.

### **AB 1897 (Hernández) Contractor Liability - OPPOSE**

Unfairly imposes liability on any contracting entity for the contractor's wage and hour violations, lack of worker's compensation coverage, and/or failure to remit employee contributions, despite the lack of any evidence that the contracting entity controlled the working conditions or wages of the contractor's employees.

### **AB 2416 (Stone) Unproven Wage Liens - OPPOSE**

Creates a dangerous and unfair precedent in the wage and hour arena by allowing employees to file liens on an employer's real or personal property, or property where work was performed, based upon alleged yet unproven wage claims.

### **SB 1280 – (Hueso) SUPPORT**

This bill would require the Department of Business Oversight to establish a licensure program for the provision of unsecured consumer loans in an amount up to \$1,000 and will empower the department to create a new regulated, unsecured consumer loan product that focuses on protecting the rights of consumers while allowing a fair rate of return for loan providers.

### **SB 994 – (Monning) SUPPORT**

This bill would enact the Consumer Car Information and Choice Act. The bill would require a manufacturer of any new motor vehicle sold or leased in this state that is manufactured on or after January 1, 2016, that records, generates, stores, or collects vehicle information, as defined, to make certain disclosures to the registered owner regarding the recordation, generation, storage, and collection of that information. The bill would require the manufacturer to provide the registered owner of the vehicle with access to the vehicle information and the ability to securely transmit that information to a 3rd party selected by the registered owner, as specified.



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**AB 2201 – (Chavez) SUPPORT**

This bill would require a person who is required to be registered with the federal act and who submits an application for an original or a renewal of a driver's license to be deemed to have consented to registration with the federal Selective Service System, as provided. The bill would require the Department of Motor Vehicles to include specified notices on an application for an original or renewal of a driver's license and would require the department to forward the necessary personal information required for registration to the federal Selective Service System in an electronic format.

**AB 1331 (Rendon) SUPPORT IF AMENDED**

This bill would replace the \$11.14 B water bond that is currently on the November 2014 ballot with a new \$8.0 B general obligation bond titled "The Clean, Safe, and Reliable Drinking Water Act of 2014."

**AB 2686 (Perea) SUPPORT**

This bill would enact the Clean, Safe, and Reliable Water Supply Act of 2014, which, if adopted by the voters, would authorize the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$9,250,000,000 an unspecified amount pursuant to the State General Obligation Bond Law to finance a clean, safe, and reliable water supply program. This bill would provide for the submission of the bond act to the voters at the November 4, 2014, statewide general election.

**SB 42 (Wolk) OPPOSE**

This bill would enact the Safe Drinking Water, Water Quality, and Flood Protection Act of 2014, which, if adopted by the voters, would authorize the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$5,600,000,000 \$6,475,000,000 pursuant to the State General Obligation Bond Law to finance a safe drinking water, water quality, and flood protection program. The bill would provide for the submission of the bond act to the voters at the November 4, 2014, statewide general election

**SB 1139 (Hueso) SUPPORT**

This bill requires retail sellers and all electric utilities, no later than December 31, 2024, to procure 500 megawatts of electricity from base load geothermal power plants

**AB 2043 (Bigelow) SUPPORT IF AMENDED**

Repeals the \$11.14 billion bond for water-related projects and programs that was drafted in 2009 (2009 Water Bond) with a revised \$7.935 billion water bond.

**SB 1250 (Hueso) SUPPORT IF AMENDED**

This bill would replace the \$11.14 B water bond that is currently on the November 2014 ballot with a new \$9.45 B general obligation bond titled "The Safe, Clean, and Reliable Drinking Water Supply Act of 2014."

**AB 2554 (Rendon) SUPPORT IF AMENDED**

Repeals the \$11.14 billion bond for water-related projects and programs that was drafted in 2009 (2009 Water Bond) and replaces it with a revised \$8.5 billion water bond.
